Electric Op

Bringing together more than ninety works spanning six decades, *Electric Op* examines how artists have used abstraction to explore the relationship between perception and technology. While today considered an art historical "dead end" with few echoes in contemporary art, Op art in fact became the first artistic movement of the Information Age, paving the way for art to be abstracted into analog and digital circuits. Just as optical illusions help us "see" ourselves in the act of seeing, Op art can help us see how vision itself has been transformed by electronic media.

Carson Waterman: Art Saved My Life

Dec 13, 2024 - Jun 1, 2025

Carson Waterman (Snipe Clan, Seneca Nation, born 1944) is a distinguished painter, draftsman, designer, sculptor, and revered cultural figure for the Haudenosaunee people of the Seneca Nation. A prolific public artist, Waterman's work can be found throughout the region.

During his service with the army in Vietnam, the division commander's recognition of his artistic talent led to Waterman's reassignment from the battlefield to the division's newspapers. Years later, he encountered his platoon leader, who had survived a harrowing battle, where only 47 men remained from a full company of 160. Waterman's art had indeed saved his life.

A Grammar of Animacy: Charles E. Burchfield and Mike Grier Nov 8, 2024 - Mar 2, 2025

The exhibition title acknowledges the concept of a "grammar of animacy" created by Robin Wall Kimmerer, a botanist and citizen of the Potawatomi Nation, to describe the linguistic attributes of the Potawatomi language. She noted that 70% of the words in Potawatomi are verbs, compared to English in which the ratio is 30%. There are verbs in Potowatomi for "to be a hill," "to be red," and "to be a long sandy stretch of beach," which is very different from English, a noun-based language, that seems very well suited for a culture of things. Kimmerer described Potowatomi as a "grammar of animacy" since it has few nouns to indicate uniqueness, but endless verbs to describe the ceaseless exchange between all things. Similarly, Burchfield and Glier invent visual, abstract vocabularies to describe intangible but dynamic aspects of landscape like light, air, sound, and temperature as elements in the visual depiction of a volatile, but glorious, living world.

Tracing Threads Through Time: The Artwork of William C. Maggio Nov 8, 2024 - Mar 30, 2025

William C. Maggio is a lifelong resident of Western New York. As an artist, educator and musician, his creative influence is a thread that can be traced through time, connecting generations of people. His artwork is a visual journey inward towards the core of the human soul.
